I am particularly interested in cinematic narratives which are named after an individual or an isolated event, while the production of the film, may take many years and involve the efforts of many people and substantiates another or simultaneous narrative; I am interested in how an 'individual' is presented as such, and what the possibilities are for this 'individual' to act on behalf of a plurality of interests.
